Children's Programming

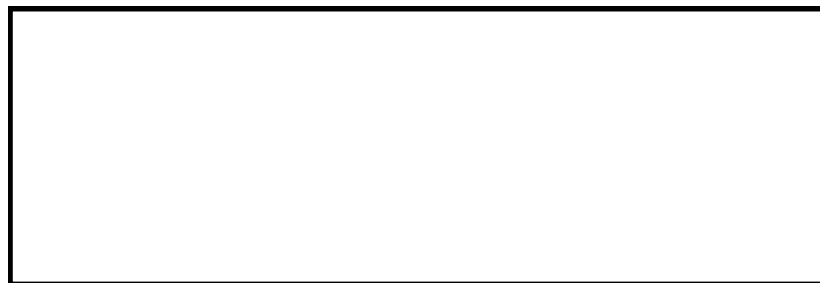

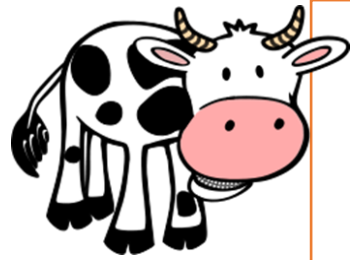

Would you like to engage in a discussion with those persons?

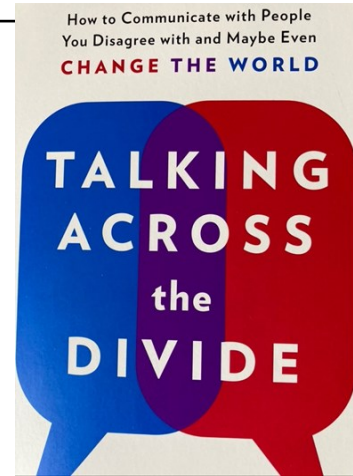

Did You Know?

You have probably noticed the beautiful quilt featuring Jesus and the Tree of Life which has graced our worship space for the past couple of years. This work was a collaboration between Charlene Mayala - who did the design based on an image in our worship book- and Cheryl Liedle and Janet Erickson, who did the applique and the background quilting. Janet also created the banners which hang in the sanctuary during the "green" season of Pentecost, which runs from Pentecost Sunday - fifty days after Easter - through Christ the King Sunday just before the beginning of Advent.



Janet and her husband, Glenn, moved to Helena and joined Our Redeemer's in 1981. Pastor Lowell Anderson introduced them to Lyle and June Pratt, which began a close friendship that has continued ever since.

Janet had a distinguished career in education, teaching in Helena public schools from 1981 through 2007. She received several awards for her teaching, including a Presidential Award for teaching science and a Helena Public Schools Distinguished teacher award, among others. She also was trained at NASA to teach about space exploration and the effects of space travel on human biology.

After retiring from teaching, Janet (who had been sewing since she was ten years old in 4H) began quilting. She soon joined Sew in Love, a ministry of the congregation that makes and donates quilts to the congregation and other charitable organizations in Helena, including the Friendship Center and Family Promise. Janet is currently working on a quilt to be raffled off to benefit our Seminary Scholarship Fund. During Covid, she also sewed hundreds of beautiful cloth masks, many of which she donated; many of us have worn those masks during worship in the past couple of years.

Janet has also sung in the choir, regularly participates in Bible study, and her huckleberry pies are renowned for making occasional - but always brief! - appearances at congregational potlucks. Janet is also a fine photographer and often takes photos at church activities for our website, Facebook page, etc. Janet is a tireless worker and servant and says, "When you serve in love, you are the one who benefits most." We thank God for you, Janet!

Words from the Bishop: All are Really Welcome

"An argument arose among [the disciples] as to which one of them was the greatest. But Jesus, aware of their inner thoughts, took a little child and put it by his side, and said to them, 'Whoever welcomes this child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me; for the least among all of you is the greatest.'"
Luke 9:46-48



"All are welcome!" That's what many signs in front of our churches or statements across our bulletins announce. All are welcome! But do we really mean "all"? And what does it mean to welcome all these "alls"?

During this month of June, the lives of a group of people who often have not been welcomed in our churches have been recognized and celebrated by our society, communities and churches as human beings worthy of dignity and respect. These people often self-identify by using one or more of a group of letters, LGBTQIA+, which stands for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, asexual, plus others who don't really fit into these categories but don't fall into a societal norm either.

Sadly, LGBTQIA+ people have not been and still are not regularly welcomed or accepted by the church that claims to be the body of Christ. Worse yet, God's name and Word have been used by those calling themselves Christian to do horrible damage to LGBTQIA+ people in their bodies, spirits, hearts, and minds. In other words, "All" have not been welcomed; only some.

Merriam-Webster's dictionary defines "all" as the *whole* amount of or *every* member of. Nothing is excluded when we use the word all. So when we use the word "all," we have to mean "all" in our words, actions, even thoughts. All means everyone. And since God's welcome into Christ's body is without condition, so must the church's welcome be to all, everyone, even in the midst of our discomfort or fears.

As Jesus himself proclaims, when we welcome those whom the world has often considered to be the least in society, we welcome Christ himself into our places, spaces and lives to be loved, accepted and cared for by the body of Christ.

It is so easy to exclude or dehumanize or demonize those who are different or those we don't understand. That is the way of the world without the love of God's welcome in it. But followers of Christ are called to welcome even in the midst of not understanding -- listening to, learning from, accepting, loving and supporting all who are different as human beings created in the image of God and as beloved children of God marked by Christ's cross forever.

Welcoming LGBTQIA+ folks into our communities means putting aside our fears, anxieties and ignorance and instead opening our hearts to the gifts, skills and experience these children of God bring into our lives. It's about remembering to walk humbly with God, never putting ourselves in God's place to condemn but instead exhorting ourselves to love and learn from our neighbors, even those who may live their lives differently. It's about "all of us being one in Christ," never putting worldly identities ahead of the identity each of us has been clothed with in our baptism into Christ. (Gal 27-28)

And so I invite you to practice welcoming LGBTQIA+ people into your communities of Christ. Because the church has so long struggled with accepting LGBTQIA+ people, this is a hard practice for congregations and their members to enter into. Maybe a good place to start is by confessing our weakness in welcoming all of God's "alls" and by repenting, changing our direction toward the love Christ calls us to embody. Maybe it's time to explore becoming a "Reconciling in Christ" congregation. (<https://www.reconcilingworks.org>)

Or maybe we begin simply by saying to a LGBTQIA+ person, "**God loves you and so do I.**" For as Paul reminds us all in Romans 8:39, "There is nothing in all of creation that can separate you from God's love in Christ Jesus."

May God bless you this week with the Spirit's infallible love. And please, let us celebrate this nation's birth safely!

Proposal by Nelson Bock

Nelson described a proposal for changing out the fluorescent lights to LED bulbs. By using Northwest Energy's E+ Commercial Lighting Rebate program, the church would save on the purchase of the replacement bulbs as well as on monthly electrical bills. Using the figures for current commercial electrical rates and our electrical usage over the last year, the National Center on Appropriate Technology estimates that we would recoup the cost of the bulbs in approximately 3 years. LEDs are predicted to last up to three times longer - up to 20+ years vs. an average of 7 years for the fluorescent bulbs, which would result in long-term savings on replacement costs.

Nelson estimates the initial total outlay for the church would amount to approximately \$6000, with \$2400 returned to the church by the Rebate; the net cost to the church would be about \$3600, not including any installation or potential equipment rental costs.

Family Promise Comfort Food Challenge

Kathy explained that ORLC has always participated in the annual Family Promise fund raiser, and that this year we will be hosting the gathering on September 8. This year's plans include a BBQ/Picnic theme. There will be food trucks in the south parking lot and the various churches will provide snacks for the estimated 400 guests. Members of the Hunger Team will be on hand to help as needed and Lori Walter will have tickets available in her office. Jan volunteered to provide advice/information during the ongoing planning since she has several years' experience with the fundraiser.

Financial Report

Sarah reported that giving has been good so far this summer. Council decided to pay the May and June Building Funds to Mission Investment and to pay Benevolence to the Synod for May, June and July from Other External Gifts.

Sarah also reported that the air conditioning is now working in the Sanctuary.

Kevin reported that the Annual Picnic committee received one grant for \$250 from Thrivent. The committee is planning for about 300 on August 27. Council agreed to provide up to \$1500 for the Picnic from the Church's Thrivent Funds.

Minutes

Minutes were approved as amended with suggested clarifications.

Ministry Team and Committee Reports

Pastor Trina's written report indicated that fall planning is being completed. Because of students' schedules, two Confirmation classes will be offered - one on Wednesday evenings and one on Sunday.

Pastor Trina will do annual staff reviews in the late fall, with an eye to current job descriptions and the evolving needs of the congregation.

Cody reported on the Property Development Team. Gretchen Krumm will hold a Q&A session on September 11 after the Service at 10:45. He said we can expect some decisions from the City in a few months as they work through applications for the ARPA funding. The County may also consider some type of contribution.

Old Business

Council discussed the evolving Covid virus, treatment options and vaccinations. Council decided to change and update our Covid Protocols and Practices to encourage people to follow their individual preferences and beliefs whether to mask or not and to attend in-person or online as they feel comfortable. Masks will remain available in the building.

Cody reported that the internet system has been upgraded which may improve the phone system. Cody provided some discontinued phone units from his work place which will hopefully help also. He will follow up with Sarah and Lori to see if things are operating better.

Kevin reported that he invited Charlene Mayala's input into the group working on building signage. The team includes Kevin, Charlene, Dave Mehl and Steve Keller.

The Outreach and Welcome Committee (formerly known as Hospitality) continues to offer coffee in the Narthex before service. If anyone wants to offer their help to let Karen Armstrong know so she can add the names to her list of providers.

Pastor Trina's Installation will be held in the afternoon of October 23. Pastor Jason Asselstine will be presiding and the Rev. Dr. David Lose will preach. A reception will follow the Installation Service.

New Business

Council agreed to gather more information on the Lighting Proposal before taking any action.

Rocky Mountain Development Council provided a large BBQ for our use for our August 27th picnic. They offered to gift it to the church.

Lynn highlighted an opportunity for Mental Health Training available for Faith Communities across Montana. Tracy explained that this is being offered through her office at the Department of Public Health and Human Services.

You may have seen the recent article in the Helena Independent Record about our project. This article was written following a presentation made by Gretchen Krumm to a joint work session of both the City and County Commissions, at which public subsidy was requested to kick-start the project.

At this meeting, Gretchen shared that the PAR (Preliminary Architectural Report) was complete and publicly available on both the church's and the City's websites. (This document can be accessed from the church website on the Property Development page, located under the "Happenings" tab).

Gretchen presented the vision behind the project and who the partners involved are. She also shared the project's planning goals which are to create a connected and walkable neighborhood that retains as much open space as possible. The proposed master plan utilizes the existing high-pressure gas line easement as a green corridor through the middle of the site, which serves to connect each partner to public amenities like walking paths, a community center, and park space. She shared that the proposed density and height of buildings was modified in concession to neighborhood feedback but still provides 33 Habitat for Humanity homes, 60 affordable rentals owned and managed by RMDC, and 20 efficiency units for YWCA.

A compelling argument was made about the beneficial role of Trust Montana, a Community Land Trust (CLT), which would hold ownership of the land on which the Habitat for Humanity homes are built. They would hold the land in trust for affordable housing and manage any resale of these homes to income-qualified buyers. The restrictions in place with a CLT home cap the earned equity at 1.5% annually. This means that in a rising market, a CLT home maintains its affordability long term and that any subsidy invested initially grows in value over time, benefiting many future generations in our community.

The county commissioners shared that about 80% of their ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds have already been committed and that the remainder is being held as contingency due to inflation. However, commissioner Andy Hunthausen voiced firm support for the project and hoped the county would study ways for them to participate. County Commissioner Jim McCormick did offer that the county could be a sponsor on grant funding applications.

The Interim City Manager Tim Burton shared that the city is still engaged in a process to decide how to commit their nearly \$8.5 million distribution and expects that they will have applications available in a couple of months for outside groups, such as ourselves, to apply for funding. The partnership intends to request \$2.4 million of ARPA funds to facilitate the property purchase and the installation of Horseshoe Bend Rd. and other infrastructure needs.

In July, the RMDC board voted that contingent on the receiving public funding and suitable partner agreements, they would be willing to act as the project's lead developer. This means they may be the intermediary property owner who sees the project through the subdivision process, rezoning, and infrastructure installation phases.

All our housing partners continue to see rising wait lists of people needing housing. Please keep these community members in your prayers as we continue to press forward in search of ways that ORLC can be Christ's hands and feet in the world.
